




1	Integrated camera (on select models)	Used for video communication or taking photos.
2	Built-in microphone (on select models)	Used for video conferencing, voice narration, or audio recording.
3	Wireless antennas (on select models)	Connects to a wireless adapter to receive and send wireless radio signals.
4	Display	Provides visual output.
5	Speakers	Provides audio output.
6	Power button	Press this button to turn on the computer.
7	Fingerprint reader (on select models)	Registers fingerprints that can be used as passwords to secure your computer.
8	Touchpad	Performs the same respective functions as a conventional mouse. Slide your fingertip on the touch pad in the direction you wish to move the cursor.
9	Touchpad buttons	Performs the functions of the left and right buttons as those of the left and right buttons on a conventional mouse.

Using the keyboard

Your computer has a numeric keypad, hotkeys, and function keys incorporated in its standard keyboard.

Numeric keypad (Applicable for B51-80)

The keyboard has a separate numeric keypad. To enable or disable the keypad, press the Numeric Lock key (**Num Lock**).



Note: The numeric lock indicator is on when the numeric keypad is enabled.

Hotkeys

You can access certain system settings quickly by pressing the appropriate hotkeys.





- **1** AC power adapter jack
- Lenovo OneLink connector (on select models)

Connects the AC power adapter.

When the AC power adapter is connected to the AC power adapter jack, it provides power to the computer and charges the battery. When a supported ThinkPad OneLink Dock is connected to the Lenovo OneLink connector, it can not only extend the computer capabilities, but also provide AC power to the computer and charge the battery.

To use the Lenovo OneLink connector, you need to remove the connector cover from the Lenovo OneLink connector first.

Note: Ensure that you keep the connector cover. Reattach it to the Lenovo OneLink connector when you are not using the Lenovo OneLink connector.

Ventilation slots Dissipates internal heat.

 Make sure that none of the ventilation slots are blocked or else overheating of the computer may occur.

VGA port Connects to external display devices.



Note: The USB 3.0 connector is compatible with USB 1.1, 2.0, and 3.0.

Connecting USB devices

You can connect a USB device to your computer by inserting its USB plug (Type A) into the USB port on your computer.



The first time you plug a USB device into a USB port on your computer, Windows automatically installs a driver for that device. After the driver is installed, you can disconnect and reconnect the device without performing any additional steps.

Note: Typically, Windows detects a newly connected device after connecting it and then installs the driver automatically. However, some devices might require you to install the driver before connecting. Check the documentation provided by the manufacturer of the device before connecting.

Before disconnecting a USB storage device, make sure your computer has finished using the device to transfer the data. Click the **Safely Remove Hardware and Eject Media** icon in the notification area of the Windows desktop screen to remove the device before disconnecting.

Note:


- If your USB device uses a power cord, connect the device to a power source before connecting it. Otherwise, the device may not be recognized.
- When the computer is in sleep mode, you can only use the keyboard instead of the mouse to wake up the computer.

Connecting to a wired network

Wired connections are a reliable and safe way to connect the computer to the Internet.





System status indicators

The system status indicators show the current status of your computer.

Power and battery status indicator \circlearrowleft

- **Green:** The battery has a charge between 20% and 100% and the AC adapter is not connected to the computer, or the battery has a charge between 80% and 100% and the AC power adapter is connected to the computer.
- **Blinking green:** The battery has a charge between 20% and 80% and the AC power adapter is connected to the computer or the computer is in sleep mode.
- **Amber:** The battery has a charge between 5% and 20% and the AC adapter is not connected to the computer.
- **Blinking amber:** The battery has a charge of 20% or less and the AC power adapter is connected to the computer.
- Off: The battery is detached, or the battery has a charge of 5% or less and the AC adapter is not connected to the computer, or the computer is powered off or in hibernate mode.

Hard disk drive indicator

When this indicator is on, the hard disk drive is reading or writing data.

Attention:

- When the indicator is on, do not put the computer into sleep mode or turn off the computer.
- When the indicator is on, do not move the computer. Sudden physical shock might cause hard disk drive errors

Using memory cards (not supplied)

Your computer supports the following types of memory card:

- Secure Digital (SD) card
- Secure Digital High Capacity (SDHC) card
- SD eXtended Capacity (SDXC) card
- MultiMediaCard (MMC)

Attention:

- Insert *only* one card in the slot at a time.
- This card reader does not support SDIO devices (Such as SDIO Bluetooth, and so on).

Inserting a memory card

Slide a memory card in until it clicks into place.

Note: If a dummy card is shipped with the computer, push the dummy card and remove it before inserting a memory card.


Removing a memory card

- **1** Push the memory card in until you hear a click.
- **2** Gently pull the memory card out of the memory card slot.

Attention:

 Before removing a memory card, disable it through Safely Remove Hardware and Eject Media to avoid data corruption.

Configuring the operating system for the first time

You may need to configure the operating system when it is first used. The configuration process may include the procedures below:

- Accepting the end user license agreement
- Configuring the Internet connection
- Registering the operating system
- Creating a user account

Operating system interfaces

The return of the Start menu

If you click the Start button in the lower-left corner, the Start menu is displayed.



The power button is on the Start menu, click it you can choose to shut down or restart the computer, or put the computer into sleep mode.

Through the Start menu, you can locate all the installed apps or view the frequently used apps.

The ACTION CENTER

Select the ACTION CENTER icon on the taskbar and the ACTION CENTER is displayed.



From the ACTION CENTER, you can examine important notifications from Windows and your apps. Moreover, you can change common settings quickly.

Task view in taskbar

In Windows 10, you can add a new desktop and switch between different desktops.

To add a new desktop, do the following:

• Click the task view icon in the taskbar area.



• Click New desktop.



To switch between desktops, click the task view icon then select your desired desktop.

Putting the computer to sleep or shutting it down

When you have finished working with your computer, you can put it to sleep or shut it down.

Putting your computer to sleep

If you will be away from your computer for only a short time, put the computer to sleep.

When the computer is in sleep mode, you can quickly wake it to resume use, bypassing the startup process.

To put the computer to sleep, do one of the following:

- Close the display lid.
- Press the power button.
- Preform the following based on the operating system.

For the Windows 7 operating system:

Click Start $\bigcirc \rightarrow$ Sleep.

For the Windows 10 operating system:

Move the cursor to the lower-left corner, and then select the Start button.
 Select Power → Sleep.

Note: Put your computer to sleep before you move it. Moving your computer while the hard disk drive is spinning can damage the hard disk, causing loss of data.

To wake the computer, do one of the following:

- Press any key on the keyboard.
- Press the power button.
- Press the Windows button.

Shutting down the computer

If you are not going to use your computer for a long time, shut it down. To shut down your computer, do one of the following:

- For the Windows 7 operating system:
 - Click Start \bigcirc \rightarrow Shut down.
- For the Windows 10 operating system:

 Move the cursor to the lower-left corner, and then select the Start button.

 Select Power (¹) → Shut down.



 Right-click the Start button in the lower-left corner and select Shut down or sign out → Shut down.



Connecting to a wireless network

Enabling wireless connection

To enable wireless functions, do one of the following:

- Click the ACTION CENTER icon in the notification area, and then deselect **Airplane mode**.
- Press 🔭 to disable airplane mode.
- For the Windows 7 operating system: Click the wireless network connection status icon in the Windows notification area. A list of available wireless networks will be displayed.
- For the Windows 10 operating system:

 Click Settings → Network & Internet → Airplane mode to open the network configuration page. Then toggle the airplane mode switch to Off.

Connecting to a wireless network

After wireless has been enabled, the computer will automatically scan for available wireless networks and display them in the wireless network list. To connect to a wireless network, click the network name in the list, and then click **Connect**.

Note: Some networks require a network security key or passphrase for connection. To connect to one of those networks, ask the network administrator or the Internet service provider (ISP) for the security key or passphrase.



■■ Get help from Windows -

If you have a problem with the operating system, see the Windows Get Started app. To open it, do one of the following:

• Move the cursor to the lower-left corner, and then select the Start button. Select **Get Started** from **All apps**.

Chapter 3. Lenovo OneKey Recovery system

The Lenovo OneKey Recovery system is software designed to back up and restore your computer. You can use it to restore the system partition to its original status in case of a system failure. You can also create user backups for easy restoration as required.

Note:

- The OneKey Recovery system is not installed on some models. Please refer to the actual
 product.
- If your computer is preinstalled with a GNU/Linux operating system, Onekey Recovery system is not available.
- To utilize the features of the OneKey Recovery system, your hard disk already includes a
 hidden partition by default to store the system image file and the OneKey Recovery system
 program files. This default partition is hidden for security reasons, which explains why the
 available disk space is less than the stated capacity.

Backing up the system partition

You can back up the system partition to an image file. To back up the system partition, do the following:

- Click OneKey Recovery on the home screen to start the Lenovo One Key Recovery system.
- **2** Click **System Backup**.
- **3** Select a back-up location and click **Next** to start the backup.

Note:

- You can choose a back-up location on the local hard disk drive or an external storage device.
- The back-up process may take a while.
- The back-up process is only available when Windows can be started normally.

Restoring

You can choose to restore the system partition to its original status or to a previously created back-up point. To restore the system partition, do the following:

- Press the Novo button or click **OneKey Recovery** on the home screen to start the Lenovo OneKey Recovery system.
- **2** Click **System Recovery**. The computer restarts to the recovery environment.

3 Follow the on-screen instructions to restore the system partition to its original status or to a previously created back-up point.

Note:

- The recovery process is irreversible. Make sure to back up any data you wish to save on the system partition before starting the recovery process.
- The recovery process may take a while. Make sure to connect the AC power adapter to your computer during the recovery process.
- The above instructions should be followed when Windows can be started normally.
- When the computer is in hibernation status, you can not start the Lenovo OneKey Recovery system by pressing the Novo button for Windows 7 system.

If Windows cannot be started, follow the steps below to start the Lenovo OneKey Recovery system:

- **1** Shut down the computer.
- **2** Press the Novo button. From the **Novo Button Menu**, select **System recovery** and press Enter.

Frequently asked questions

This section lists frequently asked questions by category.

Finding information

What safety precautions should I follow when using my computer?

The *Lenovo Safety and General Information Guide* contains safety precautions for using your computer. Read and follow all the precautions when using your computer.

Where can I find the hardware specifications for my computer?

You can find hardware specification for your computer from the printed flyers which came with your computer.

Where can I find warranty information?

For the warranty applicable to your computer, including the warranty period and type of warranty service, see the Lenovo limited warranty flyer.

Drivers and preinstalled software

Where are the installation discs for Lenovo preinstalled software (desktop software)?

Your computer did not come with installation discs for Lenovo preinstalled software. If you need to reinstall preinstalled software, you can find the installation program on the D partition of your hard disk. If you cannot find the installation program there, download it from the Lenovo consumer support Web site.

Where can I find drivers for the various hardware devices of my computer?

If your computer is preinstalled with a Windows operating system, Lenovo provides drivers for the hardware devices that you need on the D partition of your hard disk. You can also download the latest device drivers from the Lenovo consumer support Web site.

■ Lenovo OneKey Recovery system

Where are the recovery discs?

Your computer did not come with recovery discs. Use the recovery system if you need to restore the system to its factory status.

What can I do if the back-up process fails?

If you can start the backup but it fails during the back-up process, try the following steps:

- Close all open programs, and then restart the back-up process.
- **2** Check to see if the destination media is damaged. Select another path and then try again.

When do I need to restore the system to its factory status?

Use this feature when the operating system fails to start up. If there is critical data on the system partition, back it up before starting recovery.

BIOS setup utility

What is the BIOS setup utility?

The BIOS setup utility is ROM-based software. It communicates basic computer information and provides options for setting boot devices, security, hardware mode, and other preferences.

How can I start the BIOS setup utility?

To start the BIOS setup utility:

- **1** Shut down the computer.
- **2** Press the Novo button and then select **BIOS Setup**.

How can I change the boot priority?

There are two boot priorities: **UEFI First** and **Legacy First**. To change the boot priority, start the BIOS setup utility and set **Boot Priority** to **UEFI First** or **Legacy First** in the **Boot menu**.

When do I need to change the boot priority?

The default boot priorities are **UEFI First**. If you need to install a legacy operating system (that is, an earlier version than that of your current operating system) on your computer, you will need to change the boot priority to **Legacy First**. The legacy operating system cannot be installed if you do not change the boot priority.

Troubleshooting

Display problems

When I turn on the computer, nothing appears on the screen.

When I turn on the computer, only a white cursor appears on a blank

screen.

My screen goes blank while the computer is on.

- If the screen is blank, make sure that:
 - The AC power adapter is connected to the computer, and the power cord is plugged into a working electrical outlet.
 - The computer power is on. Press the power button again for confirmation.
 - If you are using the AC power adapter or the battery, and the battery status indicator is on, press
 F12 (** _____) to make the screen brighter.
- If these items are set correctly, and the screen remains blank, have the computer serviced.
- Restore backed-up files to your Windows environment or the entire contents of your hard disk to its original factory contents using the recovery system. If you still see only the cursor on the screen, have the computer serviced.
- Your screen saver or power management might be enabled. Do one of the following to exit from the screen saver or to resume from sleep mode:
 - Touch the touchpad.
 - Press any key on the keyboard.
 - Press the power button.
 - Press F9 (, to confirm whether the backlight for the LCD screen has been turned off.
 - If the problem persists, follow the solution in the next problem "The screen is unreadable or distorted."

The screen is unreadable or distorted.

- Make sure that:
 - The display device driver is installed correctly.
 - The screen resolution and color quality are set correctly.
 - The monitor type is correct.

Incorrect characters appear on the screen.

 Are the operating system or programs installed correctly? If they are installed and configured correctly, have the computer serviced.

BIOS password problems

I forgot my password.

- If you forget your user password, you must ask the system administrator to reset your user password.
- If you forget your HDD password, a Lenovo authorized servicer cannot reset your password or recover data from the hard disk. You must take your computer to a Lenovo authorized servicer or a marketing representative to have the hard disk drive replaced. Proof of purchase is required, and a fee will be charged for parts and service.
- If you forget your Supervisor password, a Lenovo authorized servicer cannot reset your password. You must take your computer to a Lenovo authorized servicer or a marketing representative to have the system board replaced. Proof of purchase is required, and a fee will be charged for parts and service.

Sleep problems

The critical low-battery error message appears, and the computer immediately turns off.

The computer enters sleep mode immediately after Power-on self-test (POST).

- The battery power is getting low. Connect the AC power adapter to the computer, or replace the battery with a fully charged one.
- Make sure that:
 - The battery is charged.
 - The operating temperature is within the acceptable range. See "Chapter 2. Use and care Information" in the *Lenovo Safety and General Information Guide*.

Note: If the battery is charged and the temperature is within an acceptable range, have the computer serviced.

The computer does not return from sleep mode, and the computer does not work.

- If your computer is in sleep mode, connect the AC power adapter to the computer and then press the Fn key or the power button.
- If the system still does not return from sleep mode, stops responding, or cannot be turned off, reset the computer. Unsaved data may be lost. To reset the computer, press and hold the power button for 4 seconds or more.

Sound problems

No sound can be heard from the speakers even when the volume is turned up.

- Make sure that:
 - The mute function is off.
 - The combo audio jack is not used.
 - The speakers are selected as the playback device.

Battery problems

The computer does not operate with a fully charged battery.

The surge protector in the battery might be active.
 Turn off the computer for one minute to reset the protector; then turn on the computer again.

Hard disk drive problem

The hard disk drive does not work.

 In the Boot menu in the BIOS setup utility, make sure that the hard disk drive is included in the EFI list.

Other problems

Your computer does not respond.

- To turn off your computer, press and hold the power button for 4 seconds or more. If the computer still does not respond, remove the battery pack and the AC power adapter.
- Your computer might lock when it enters sleep mode during a communication operation. Disable the sleep timer when you are working on the network.

The computer does not start from a device you want.

- See the EFI list of the BIOS setup utility. Make sure that the BIOS setup utility is set so that the computer starts from the device you want.
- Also make sure that the device from which the computer starts is enabled. Make sure that the device is included in the EFI list in the BIOS setup utility correctly.
- Press **F12** when the Lenovo logo appears on the screen while the computer is starting up to select the device you want the computer starts from.

The connected external device does not work.

- Do not connect or disconnect any external device cables other than USB while the computer power is on; otherwise, you might damage your computer.
- When using a high power consumption external device such as an external USB optical disk drive, use an external device power adapter. Otherwise, the device might not be recognized, or system shut down might result.

Customer Replaceable Units (CRUs) are parts that can be upgraded or replaced by the customer. If a CRU is determined to be defective during the warranty period, a replacement CRU will be provided to the customer. Customers are responsible for installing the self-service CRUs for this product. Customers also can install optional-service CRUs, which might require some technical skills or tools, or request that a technician install the optional-service CRU under the terms of the applicable warranty service type for your country or region.


■ Replacing the battery pack

Note:

- Use only the battery provided by Lenovo. Any other batteries could ignite or explode.
- Make sure the computer is turned off and all the cables disconnected from the computer before you replace the battery pack.
- Make sure the computer display is closed to avoid being damaged.

To replace the battery pack, do the following:

① Unlock the manual battery latch ① . While holding the spring-loaded battery latch in the unlocked position ② , remove the battery pack in the direction shown by the arrow ③ .



- 2 Install a fully charged battery pack.
- **3** Slide the manual battery latch to the locked position.

Replacing the hard disk drive

You can increase the storage capacity of your computer by replacing the hard disk drive with one of greater capacity. You can purchase a new hard disk drive from your reseller or Lenovo marketing representative.

Notes:

- Replace the hard disk drive only for upgrading or repair. The connectors and bay of the hard disk drive were not designed for frequent changes or drive swapping.
- The preinstalled software are not included on an optional hard disk drive.
- Make sure the computer is turned off and all the cables disconnected from the computer before you replace the hard disk drive.
- · Make sure the computer display is closed to avoid being damaged.


Handling a hard disk drive

- Do not drop the drive or subject it to physical shock. Put the drive on a material, such as soft cloth, that absorbs any physical shock.
- Do not apply pressure to the cover of the drive.
- Do not touch the connector of the drive.


The hard disk drive is very sensitive. Incorrect handling can cause damage and permanent loss of data on the hard disk. Before removing the hard disk drive, make a backup copy of all the information on the hard disk, and then turn the computer off. Never remove the hard disk drive while the system is operating or in sleep mode.

To replace the hard disk drive, do the following:


- Remove the battery pack. For details, see "Replacing the battery pack" on page 32.
- ${f 2}$ Remove the screws ${f 1}$, and then remove the bottom slot cover ${f 2}$.



3 Remove the frame fixing screws **3**.



Remove the hard disk drive by gently pulling it in the direction of the arrow **4**.



- Remove the screws and detach the metal frame from the hard disk drive.
- Attach the metal frame to a new hard disk drive and tighten the screws.
- **7** Slide the new hard disk drive firmly into place, and then reinstall the frame fixing screws to secure the drive.
- Reinstall the bottom slot cover and tighten the screws.
- Reinstall the battery pack. For details, see "Replacing the battery pack" on page 32.

Replacing the memory


You can increase the amount of memory in your computer by installing double data rate three synchronous dynamic random access memory (DDR3L SDRAM)-available as an option-in the memory slot of your computer. DDR3L SDRAM modules are available in various capacities.

Note:


- Use only the memory types supported by your computer. If you incorrectly install
 optional memory, or install an unsupported memory type, a warning beep will sound
 when you try to start the computer.
- Make sure the computer is turned off and all the cables disconnected from the computer before you replace the memory.
- Make sure the computer display is closed to avoid being damaged.

To install a DDR3L SDRAM module, do the following:


- Touch a metal table or a grounded metal object to reduce any static electricity in your body, which could damage the DDR3L SDRAM. Do not touch the contact edge of the DDR3L SDRAM module.
- **2** Remove the battery pack. For details, see "Replacing the battery pack" on page 32.
- ${f 3}$ Remove the screws ${f 1}$, and then remove the bottom slot cover ${f 2}$.



4 If two DDR3L SDRAM modules are already installed in the memory slot, remove one of them to make room for the new one by pulling out on the latches on both edges of the socket at the same time. Be sure to save the old DDR3L SDRAM for future use.



- **6** Align the notch of the DDR3L SDRAM module with the protrusion of the socket and gently insert the new module at a 30-45° angle.
- **6** Push the DDR3L SDRAM module down until the latches on both sides of the socket lock into its position.



• After aligning the attachment clips with their matching gaps, reinstall the bottom slot cover.


